1	Academic Dependency in the Social Sciences: Structural Reality and Intellectual Challenges/ Kathinka Sinha-Kerkhoff, Syed Farid Alatas(ed.)-- Manohar: New Delhi, 2010; 333p.	52056
	<p>This book deals with the academic dependency of scholars variously positioned in the South. All contributors to this book acknowledge that though the place might play a different role in the contemporary globalized world, the location of people has not become irrelevant. However, there is limited knowledge about the impact of place among academicians differently located in the South and of the costs and benefits of academic globalization. The main purpose of this book, therefore, is to increase knowledge about the net result of such a calculus today for various regions in the South. Though all scholars in this book look upon academic dependency as a problem, there are differences of opinion as to what constitutes academic dependency, what its manifestations are, and how to cope with academic dependency. The papers in this volume deal with two major differences or levels of the problem of academic dependency, that is, theoretical and practical. The editors think it is essential that academic dependency be understood and dealt with along these two levels as this will enable an appreciation of the magnitude of the problem and serious consideration of the options available as measures to overcome academic dependency are considered.</p>

This approach, known as neural computation, allows for more flexible and adaptable processing of information and has the potential to revolutionize the way we approach computation. Current computer technology doubles in power roughly every two years, an increase called Moore's Law. This constant increase is predicted to come to an end soon. Digital technology will change. Although digital computers dominate today's world, there are alternative ways to compute which might be better and more efficient than digital computation. After Digital looks at where the field of computation began and where it might be headed and offers predictions about a collaborative future relationship between human cognition and mechanical computation.

- 8 Banking and Financial Markets: How Banks and Financial Technology Are Reshaping Financial Markets/ Bilan, Andrada-- Palgrave MacMillan: Switzerland, 2019; ix,221p. 52073

The traditional role of a bank was to transfer funds from savers to investors, engage in maturity transformation, screen for borrower risk and monitor borrower effort in doing so. A typical loan contract was set up along six simple dimensions: the amount, the interest rate, the expected credit risk (determining both the probability of default for the loan and the expected loss given default), the required collateral, the currency, and the lending technology. However, the modern banking industry today has a broad scope, offering a range of sophisticated financial products, a wider geography -- including exposure to countries with various currencies, regulations and monetary policy regimes -- and an increased reliance on financial innovation and technology. These new bank business models have had repercussions on the loan contract. In particular, the main components and risks of a loan contract can now be hedged on the market, utilizing interest rate swaps, foreign exchange transactions, credit default swaps and securitization. Securitized loans can often be pledged as collateral, thus facilitating new lending. And lending technology is evolving from one-to-one meetings between a loan officer and a borrower, at a bank branch, towards potentially disruptive technologies such as peer-to-peer lending, crowdfunding or digital wallet services. This book studies the interaction between traditional and modern banking and the economic benefits and costs of this new financial ecosystem, by relying on recent empirical research in banking and finance and exploring the effects of increased financial sophistication on a particular dimension of the loan contract.

- 9 Between Survival and Status: The Counter-hegemonic Geopolitics of Iran/ Saraswat, Deepika-- Macmillan Publishers Indian Private Ltd: Chennai, 2022; vi,212p. 52060

This book explores how the Islamic and revolutionary identity of Iran has been (re)produced in the geopolitical discourse of Iranian state elites over forty years from the Islamic Revolution in 1979 to 2019. The point of departure for this book is that forty years since its foundation, the Islamic Republic of Iran has pursued a counter-hegemonic geopolitics steeped in the Islamic ideology articulated by its founder Ayatollah Khomeini. This counter-hegemonic geopolitics has been successful in realising its overarching goal of preserving Iran's unique religiopolitical system and making Iran an indispensable regional power while challenging and transforming the US-dominated order in West Asia. Using critical geopolitics, the book tries to understand how the transformation of Shi'i Islam into a religiopolitical ideology of the Islamic Revolution and the organizing principle of the Islamic Republic led to the emergence of new religiopolitical imagination (s) of Iran. In foregrounding the religious and postcolonial underpinnings of Iranian geopolitics, the study focuses on the foreign policy discourse and also looks into discourses belonging to the 'domestic' domain. It examines how dominant geopolitical imaginaries of the Islamic Republic and the West as the hegemonic 'other' have been constructed, contested, and reworked by different political factions as well as a civil society over the last four decades. The book will be useful for both specialists and students interested in the field of critical geopolitics as well as Iranian and West Asian Studies.

- 10 Beyond Public Policy: A Public Action Languages Approach/ Kevin Spink, Peter-- Edward Elgar Publishing Limited: United Kingdom, 2019; 256p. 52090

In democracies, power is obtained via competition. Yet, as women gain access to parliaments in record numbers, worldwide collaboration appears to be on the rise. This is puzzling: why, if politicians can secure power through competition, would we observe collaboration in Congress? Using evidence from 200 interviews with politicians from Argentina and a novel dataset from 23 Argentine legislative chambers over 18 years, Gendering Legislative Behavior reexamines traditional notions of competitive democracy by evaluating patterns of collaboration among legislators. Although only the majority can secure power via competition, all legislators - particularly those who do not have power - can influence the policy-making process through collaboration. Tiffany D. Barnes argues that as women have limited access to formal and informal political power, they collaborate more than men to influence policy-making. Despite the benefits of collaboration, patterns of collaboration vary among women because different legislative contexts either facilitate or constrain women's collaboration.

Other Forms of International Protection/ Volker Turk, Alice Edwards, Cornelis Wouters(ed.)-- Cambridge University Press: New York, 2017; 267p.

The impact of violence and conflict on refugee status determination and international protection is a key developing field. Given the contemporary dynamics of armed conflict, how to interpret and apply the refugee definitions at global and regional levels is increasingly relevant to governmental policy-makers, decision-makers, legal practitioners, academics and students. This book will provide a comprehensive analysis of the global and regional refugee instruments as they apply to claimants in flight from situations of armed violence and conflict,

exploring their interrelationship and how they are interpreted and applied (or should be applied). As part of a broader United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees project to develop guidelines on the interpretation and application of international refugee law instruments to claimants fleeing armed conflict and other situations of violence, it includes contributions from leading scholars and practitioners in this field as well as emerging authors with specific expertise.

This book tells about us extreme weather and climate events, interacting with exposed and vulnerable human and natural systems, can lead to disasters. This Special Report explores the challenge of understanding and managing the risks of climate extremes to advance climate change adaptation. Weather- and climate-related disasters have social as well as physical dimensions. As a result, changes in the frequency and severity of the physical events affect disaster risk, but so do the spatially diverse and temporally dynamic patterns of exposure and vulnerability. Some types of extreme weather and climate events have increased in frequency or magnitude, but populations and assets at risk have also increased, with consequences for disaster risk. Opportunities for managing risks of weather- and climate-related disasters exist or can be developed at any scale, local to international. Some strategies for effectively managing risks and adapting to climate change involve adjustments to current activities. Others require transformation or fundamental change.

- 28 Misreading Law Misreading Democracy/ Nourse, Victoria-- Harvard University Press: United Kingdom, 2016; 272p. 52093

The book argues that the dominant legal theories and practices in the US have led to a "misreading" of both law and democracy, with significant implications for the protection of individual rights and the functioning of democratic institutions. This misguided pedagogy, says Victoria Nourse, undercuts the core of legal practice. It may even threaten the continued functioning of American democracy, as contempt for the legislature becomes entrenched in legal education and judicial opinions. Misreading Law, Misreading Democracy turns a spotlight on lawyers' and judges' pervasive ignorance about how Congress makes law. Victoria Nourse not only offers a critique but proposes reforming the way lawyers learn how to interpret statutes by teaching the legislative process. Statutes are legislative decisions, just as judicial opinions are decisions. Her approach, legislative decision theory, reverse-engineers the legislative process to simplify the task of finding Congress's meanings when statutes are ambiguous. This theory revolutionizes how we understand legislative history—not as an attempt to produce some vague notion of legislative intent but as a surgical strike for the best evidence of democratic

context. Countering the academic view that the legislative process is irrational and unseemly, Nourse makes a forceful argument that lawyers must be educated about the basic procedures that define how Congress operates today. Lawmaking is a sequential process with political winners and losers. If lawyers and judges do not understand this, they may well embrace the meanings of those who opposed legislation rather than those who supported it, making legislative losers into judicial winners, and standing democracy on its head.

This book examines how an error in global meta-policy set climate change negotiations on an unproductive course. The book represents a collection of his own experience, interviews with participating entities and his engagement with African and Indian businessmen, and academics. institutional leaders and the like. This book is intended to serve as a major source of information and perspective on India's African engagement in the 21st century.

This book is an untold story of the most celebrated part of the Constitution. Until the twentieth century, few Americans called the first ten constitutional amendments drafted by James Madison in 1789 and ratified by the states in 1791 the Bill of Rights. President Franklin D. It was only after the Cold War began that the Bill of Rights took on its modern form as the most powerful symbol of the limits on government power. For example, we are accustomed to seeing the Bill of Rights at the end of the Constitution, but Madison wanted to put them in the middle of the document. Why was his plan rejected and what impact did that have on constitutional law? Today we also venerate the first ten amendments as the Bill of Rights, but many Supreme Court opinions say that only the first eight or first nine amendments. Why was that and why did that change? The Bill of Rights that emerges from Magliocca's fresh historical examination is a living text that means something different for each generation and reflects the great ideas of the Constitution--individual freedom, democracy, states' rights, judicial review, and national power in times of crisis.

While most of these organizations have no direct connection to human rights issues, their participation in broader IGO networks has important implications for the human rights practices of their member states. Featuring a rigorous empirical analysis, *Transmitting Rights* shows that countries tend to adopt similar human rights practices to those of their IGO partners, whether for better or worse. Greenhill argues that IGOs constitute a tightly-woven fabric of ties between states and that this network provides an important channel through which states can influence the behaviour of others. Indeed, his analysis suggests that a policy of isolating "rogue" states is probably self-defeating given that this will reduce their exposure to some of the more positive IGO-based influences on their human rights. Greenhill's analysis of the role of IGOs in rights diffusion will not only increase our understanding of the international politics of human rights but will also reshape how we think about the role of international institutions in world politics.

- 46 *Tribal Heritage: An Overlooked Chapter of Indian History*/ Misra, Promode Kumar- - Aayu publications: New Delhi, 2018; xxvii,333p. 52054
